The History of the Bonnie Blue Flag

The earliest known use of the this flag dates to 1810. On September 11, 1810 the West Florida Dragoons set out for the provincial capital of Baton Rouge under this flag. They captured the city, imprisoned the Spanish Governor and on September 23, 1810 raised the Bonnie Blue flag over the Fort of Baton Rouge. Three days later, the President of the West Florida Convention signed a Declaration of Independence and the flag became a symbol of the new Republic. On

December 10 of that year The US flag replaced the Bonnie Blue after President Madison issued a proclamation declaring West Florida under Federal control. With this rebellion in mind, Texas used the single star from 1836 until 1839 as the official flag of the Republic of Texas.

On January 9, 1861 The Convention of the People of Mississippi adopted an Ordinance of Secession. With this announcement, the Blue flag was raised over the Capitol building in Jackson. Irish actor Harry McCarthy

was so inspired that he wrote the song called "The Bonnie Blue Flag", bonnie being the Scottish word for beautiful. This song, in turn, became the second most popular song of the Confederacy. The Confederate Government did not officially adopt this flag but the people did (see battle flag), and the lone star flags were used in some form in 5 of the Southern States that adopted new flags in 1861.

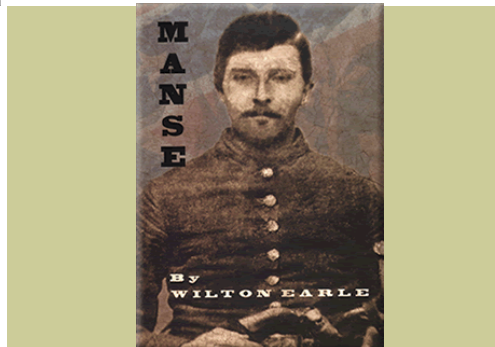
